Temple University Hosts Internationalization Program

Program Funded by U.S. Embassy

Japanese University Staff and Faculty Meet with American Counterparts

Select administrators from Japanese institutions of higher education were joined by their American counterparts for a 12-day training program organized by TUJ with funding from the U.S. Embassy in Japan.

Held from June 22 to July 3, the event brought Japanese faculty and staff who are charged with internationalizing efforts on their respective campuses together to study Temple University's best practices.

Participants spent several days in Tokyo attending lectures on a range of topics offered by Temple University, Japan Campus administrators, including a comparative study of organizational structures in Japanese and U.S. higher education offered by Dean Bruce Stronach.

The program also included guest speaker Mariko Bando, Chancellor of Showa Women's University, who offered the keynote lecture: "Challenge and opportunity for higher education at Japanese universities."

Wine on Tap for Alumni

The Temple University Alumni Association, Tokyo Chapter hosted a Wine Seminar and Summer Wine Party in Shibuya on September 11.

The event was led by winemaker Yoshiaki "Nick" Hasumi, owner and CEO of Hasumi Farm & Winery in Nagano.



The program took an informative look at viticulture and wine production in Japan, and guests sampled a selection of fine wines while reconnecting with old TUJ friends.

In breakout sessions, participants shared their experiences and concerns about academic advising, student services and counseling, admissions, and career development and internship programs, among other topics.

The participants then moved on to the U.S. where they spent four days at Temple University's main campus in Philadelphia attending lectures on U.S. administrative infrastructure and strategic planning, academic support initiatives, global partnership programs, international student services, faculty development and pedagogy, and risk management systems. Issues including study abroad, international admissions and research were also addressed in separate breakout sessions.

The final day of the program took the delegation to Washington D.C. where they exchanged views with officials at the U.S. Department of Education and the Japanese Embassy.

Student Film Featured in Subtitling Event in Tokyo

TUJ Launches Ph.D. in Music Therapy Program

First intensive courses offered in Tokyo.

A distance learning program directly connecting students in Asia with Temple University’s main campus in Philadelphia kicked off this past spring. The first ever annual intensive courses in Tokyo held April 25 to May 1 had six Ph.D. students participating in three courses: quantitative research in music therapy, medical music therapy, and a doctoral seminar.


“It is wonderful for us to be able to offer courses here at TUJ, the first English-language music therapy Ph.D. program in Asia, exploring the possibilities of developing working professionals in response to the growing needs in Asia,” said Cheryl Dileo, professor and music therapy Ph.D. program director, visting Tokyo from Temple’s main campus in Philadelphia.

In the Japanese Music Therapy Association (JMTA), there are approximately 5,500 members, and Dileo foresees more and more music therapists throughout Asia being in search of doctoral level studies and research.

TUJ and Showa Women’s University Sign Agreement

Temple University, Japan Campus (TUJ) and Showa Women’s University (SWU) signed a landmark agreement on credit transfer on June 21.

The articulation agreement allows students from each school to register for credit-bearing courses at either university, creating opportunities for student exchange between Japanese and American institutions that will take advantage of the best characteristics of each.

SWU has a branch campus in Boston, Massachusetts, and vigorously promotes global education. It expects access to TUJ’s program to help its own students returning from Boston maintain and improve their English.

The school also hopes that the arrangement will offer advance preparation for their students planning to study abroad in the future.

In turn, TUJ students will be able to enhance their understanding of Japan and Japanese through lectures offered at SWU, whose educational philosophy puts a strong emphasis on Japanese language education and the importance of its culture and tradition.
