The new curriculum will include oral presentation and scientific writing courses for Ph.D. students and general English development through content-based courses on science fiction films for master's students. Tokyo University of Science is the first Japanese university to form such an affiliation with TUJ. The intention is to increase the number of doctoral and master's sections and to add undergraduate courses in April 2008.

New Business Administration Major To Be Launched

Starting with the fall 2007 semester, TUJ will offer a Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) degree as part of its thriving undergraduate program. Our BBA course curriculum will be identical to what the Fox School of Business and Management offers at the main campus. Since the Fox School is fully accredited by AACSB International, the premier accrediting agency for business administration programs worldwide, TUJ's BBA program will also be AACSB-accredited.

> TUJ is adding the new BBA program to meet several specific needs. Japanese companies are moving away from traditional HR and staffing models, while foreign corporations often cite the difficulty of hiring qualified employees as a major impediment to doing business in Japan. Both are looking for employees with critical thinking and analytical skills

and a multicultural perspective. Students in Japan are also demanding high-level business programs to make themselves more attractive to potential employers, and overseas students are seeking opportunities to learn about how to work in and with Japanese corporations.

"I chose this major because I'm really interested in working as a stock analyst in the future," says one student, Yuko Sasaki. "The business major will help me achieve my dream not only to become an analyst but also to gain in-depth knowledge of the business world today. I want to increase my business sense by discussing with professors."

The BBA program is the latest addition to TUJ's fast-growing undergraduate program, which offers 10 other majors and which attracts students from about 40 countries worldwide. It will help to further strengthen TUJ's ties with multinational corporations, many of which already hire TUJ interns and graduates.

Temple Educational Center Update



Harvard-trained architect Hisava Sugiyama will take the lead in the Temple Education

Hisaya Sugiyama has been hired as director of the Temple Educational Center (TEC) project. Sugiyama, an internationally experienced architect who earned an advanced degree from Harvard University's Graduate

School of Design, will be responsible for accelerating the process of securing the site, developing the concept, and overseeing the planning, design and construction of this unique facility.

TUJ has also retained Mitsubishi Estate as the project manager, Shimizu Corporation as the local architect and contractor, and New York City design firm Kohn Pedersen Fox Associates (KPF) as the designer. Together with Merrill Lynch Japan, the project's financial advisor, they form a strong team. KPF, known for its expertise in mixed-use buildings and educational facilities, began the concept design phase in mid-March. TEC will accommodate the university's rapidly growing student population and also serve the community as a center of international education, intercultural exchange, and community activities.

"This will be a demanding project and require a great deal of coordination between the user groups, equity partners, designers, and contractors," Sugiyama commented. "I'm thrilled to take on this challenge, and believe my background will contribute to the project's success."

TUJ Campus Makeovers and Moves

The main space on the first floor of Azabu Hall got a makeover during the December 2006 break that will make it easier to serve our fast-growing student body. The space, shared by the Academic Advising Center and Continuing Education, was reconfigured to give both programs more room and better usability, including new service counters to improve interaction with students.

In Fukuoka, the TESOL Fukuoka Center

has concluded an agreement that allows it to use space at Fukuoka Jogakuin's Tenjin satellite campus for classes, weekend seminars, and events. The new facility promises to bring a few key improvements to the center's program. One benefit is that the center will be able to host the distinguished lecture series, which previously was only possible at the Tokyo and Osaka centers. Another is that TESOL Fukuoka Center students will have access to Fukuoka Jogakuin's computer labs, enabling TUJ to offer computer-based courses there. TUJ and Fukuoka Jogakuin will have a cooperative relationship going forward, including sharing information on student recruiting.

Minato City and TUJ Tighten Bond

The TUJ library began lending its books through Minato City libraries in February of this year. Minato City residents who hold a Minato City library card are therefore able to borrow books from TUJ's collection at their local library. In addition, the library has launched a "Minato-ku Guest Patron Program" in which 50 guest library cards were issued to Minato City residents for the 2007 calendar year. The library guest patron program allows cardholders to browse the collection, check out library materials, and use in-house reference materials. All the cards were given away within a few weeks after the program was launched.

Another recent highlight of TUJ's services to the Minato community was a series of lessons combining cross-cultural insights and English instruction for students at Minato City elementary and junior high schools. During March, TUJ faculty and staff of various cultural backgrounds visited five Minato schools to conduct lessons about their home countries. Akabane Elementary School students learned about Sri Lanka, Koyo Junior High School students heard about Australia, and Russia was the topic

at Higashimachi Elementary School. Later in the month, students at Takanawadai Elementary School got an insider's view of China, and kids at Shibaura Elementary School learned about Germany. TUJ intends to continue this service, including involving TUJ students in the future.
